The Colditz Seminar takes its name from the (in)famous World War II POW prison that was located in a castle, and is now a museum and hostel. The background helps embed the function of international law and norms in influencing cultures of security in the form of state behavior, and that of individuals in the service of the state.

Leipzig and International History:

Morning will start with a walking tour of central Leipzig, where students will learn about the longer history of Leipzig, including the early cold war period where the Americans were in the region and pulled back. They will also receive a tour and explanation of the events of 1989-1990, providing a compelling arch between 1945 and 1990.

The Dresden Seminar:

War, Society, and Rethinking Security

The Dresden Seminar provides a dramatic backdrop for a discussion of the relationship between violence and foreign policy, about the emergence of new cultures of security in the nexus of force, law, and order. Students will receive information about the fire bombing of Dresden during World War II and its historical legacy.
